It is our fervent desire that this Church shall, through conscientious teaching and discipleship classes, build a community of faith whose membership shall constitute of men and women, adults and youths, whose lives in the various units, spheres and echelons of society shall be Christ-like in thought, speech and conducts. There is no gainsaying that the Church, families and society will have innumerable testimonies of restored peace and harmonious relationships to share in the event of such palatable development.

We have painstakingly perused the pages of this study manual and have no qualms in commending it for use in the weekly Sunday school classes across the Diocese. It is, however, important to note that all the time, efforts and resources committed to this noble work will amount to a colossal waste if the manual is not put to proper use. We are therefore constrained to here reiterate our existing charge that Sunday school remains an indispensable part of our Sunday services, and that, at least, one hour should be allotted to it in the service programmes. The 2017 adult Sunday School theme "Attitudes and Role Relationships of the New Man" is a confluence of the themes of the two important programmes of our Diocese in 2016, the Discipleship/Revival Conference and the Synod. It is apparent from the wordings of this theme that it was borne out of a strong yearning in the heart of our Bishop, Rt. Rev'd Innocent Uchechukwu Ordu, JP, for wholesome edification of members of our Diocesan community whose lives should model exemplary Christian conducts at the various spheres and strata of the society, especially in families, businesses, careers, neighborhoods, and the church.

We live in a period where it appears that as churches spring up daily in multiples, crimes and other societal vices progress geometrically, so much so that the Church appears to have lost that essential spiritual unction to function as society's moral rudder. Consequently, while churches are packed full with those who profess Christ and appear captivated by the Word of God preached and taught from various formal and informal pulpits which dot society, feelers from the various families, offices, communities and churches indicate strongly that the very same 'strong church members who shout, quake and moan at church meetings and ministrations have very little or virtually nothing to offer society in terms of positive testimonies given the ways and manners they conduct themselves across society.

It is in recognition of this ugly scenario that the Bishop seeks to, through these studies, impress upon all Diocesan faithful the urgent need for genuine regeneration experiences across the rank and file of the Diocesan community so that through our lIves, confessions and conducts, Christ would be modelled for the ultimate benefits of the various relationships in which we find ourselves in society.

For the purpose of these studies, the new man is that inward man recreated in righteousness and true holiness and renewed in knowledge after the image of Jesus Christ. That is the genuine portrait of every bona fide Christian. It is therefore expected that most of those who sit on our churches' pews for worship should have experienced that genuine spiritual transformation which qualifies us for the new life in Christ Jesus. Unfortunately, the reverse seems to be the case, and that is partly what this year's Sunday school theme seeks to redress.

There are 7 sub themes, each of which contains study topics designed to help dissect essential areas of the theme, and there are 52 studies in all, covering the 52 weeks in the year. It is therefore expected that, except in very extreme cases, Sunday school classes should be regular part of our Sunday services. It is hoped that as Churches progress in these studies, there should be manifest evidences of positive attitudinal changes, especially in the way we relate with each other and with others anywhere anytime.

We advise that, to obtain optimal benefits from these studies, teachers should ensure consistent prayerful preparations ahead of every Sunday School class, during which grey areas and other sensitive issues which could derail or hamper fruitful study flow are resolved. We pray that as we partner with the Holy Spirit in our teaching ministry this year, our Churches would be impacted in a manner that all ailing relationships involving our members shall experience healing and restoration.

TEXT:

AIM:

To help participants understand the concepts of attitudes and behavior, distinguish one from the other, and relate them to the life of an average believer in Christ Jesus.

INTRODUCTION

Attitude has been defined by Dr Myles Munroe of blessed memory as "the mind-set or mental conditioning that determines our interpretation of and response to our environment. In his words, "attitude creates your world and determines your destiny."

In his Presidential Address/Bishop's Charge at the 1st Session of the 3rd Synod of the Diocese of Evo, the Rt. Revd. Innocent U. Ordu, JP, defined attitude simply as "an inward feeling expressed by outward behavior."

Behaviour is an action or reaction that occurs in response to an event or internal stimuli.' Behaviour usually reflects established beliefs and attitudes, but may also be a result of social pressure.

In the Parable of the Talents, it is evident that the third servant's action (burying the one talent he received) was an outward expression of his inner feelings about his master (Matt. 25; 24,25). We may gain a deeper understanding as we proceed in this study.

- 2. Behaviour can be influenced by a number of other factors beyond attitude or mind-set. Explain how the following can do so;
 - a) monetary factors, John 12; 4-6
 - b) social influences, like peer group, neighbourhood, 1Cor. 15; 33
 - c) convenience, Gen. 25; 29-34
- 3. In the light of Matt. 25; 24,25, identify and discuss some of the negative attitudes which pervade our local churches and how they affect our actions and reactions towards the things of God and other brethren.
 - b) How can these unwholesome attitudes and behaviour be redressed?

CONCLUSION

People's attitudes or mind-sets influence their actions and reactions (behavior), and that includes the way they relate with their immediate and remote environment. It is important to note, however, that the Gospel has the power to alter positively our perceptions and overall responses to stimuli.

AIM:

To help the brethren understand the true concept of the new man and the expectations of God and man concerning his life.



he new man is one who is in Christ (2 Cor. 5; 17). It is the inward man recreated in righteousness and true holiness and renewed in knowledge after the image of Jesus Christ. The scriptural picture of the new man is that of one who has undergone a transformational process during which the "old man" stepped aside to pave way for a brand new life anchored on simple faith in Christ Jesus.

INTRODUCTION

he Apostle Paul uses the word natural to refer to someone who is still in his original, natural state, whose life is not yielded to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. He lacks the Spirit of God and, consequently, operates entirely by human wisdom and is generally influenced by the fleshly passions, desires, appetites and sensory reflexes.

he Church is obviously a mixed multitude- the natural, the carnal, and the spiritual. Whichever side of these states one finds oneself clearly pictures the kind of mind-set or attitude they carry about. Unfortunately, there are disturbing indications that a vast majority of the members in most of our local churches are still comfortably reclining in the natural state, and this has very ugly consequences.

AIMS:

Highlight the fact that a new mindset is needed for the new man and discuss the impact of this new mindset.



t is apparent from previous studies that our attitude reflects our human nature and is a mind-set built over the years through formal and informal education, personal observations, and other experiences in the environment in which we grew up. Our attitude affects the way we think or feel about our immediate and remote environments and. consequently, influences our actions, reactions and responses, positively or negatively, toward a certain idea, object, person, or situation.

We learn from the scriptures that we all carry about us two opposing natures- the old and the new. The old nature (or old man) is that which is patterned

after Adam and is a darkened or unregenerate mind-set, contrary to the life of God and, therefore, in enmity with Him. On the other hand, the new man (or new nature) is a

7regenerated mind-set, patterned after Christ, spiritually minded, loves God, and is anchored on godly principles.

These two natures are always at war with each other, and whichever side that is winning at any point in our lives is clearly reflected in the way we think, speak, act and respond to life's issues, incentives and rewards. Yet it is imperative that upon the new birth, the old must be completely discarded so the new can enjoy an uninterrupted reign in the believer's life. What does the scripture command us to do. That is the focus of our study today.

espite his very deep spirituality, Apostle Paul humbly declares, "For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) dwelleth no good thing" (Rom 7:18a). This applies to every Christian. However, where the Spirit of Christ is allowed a free and wholesome reign in a believer's life, the unregenerate mind-set is rendered redundant and worthless while the transformed mind-set is set at liberty as it begins to express a deep passion for God and for whatever would gladden and endear us to Him..



he Merriam-Webster dictionary defines roles as socially expected behaviour pattern usually determined by an individual's status in a particular society, it also defines it as a part that someone or something has in a particular activity or situation. Role relationship is defined as aspects of a relationship consisting of the reciprocal role expectations of each person towards the other.

Every facet of the human society, organization, or group has role prescriptions peculiar to them, and those who form part of them are expected to conform to the prescribed or expected relationship behaviour patterns.

Failure by members to live up to their role responsibilities sends very wrong signals across the group and impacts very negatively on the entire body.

The focus of this study is to analyse some of the role responsibilities vested in us by aspects of the society and to determine to what extent our new identity "in Christ" should impact how we conduct ourselves in whatever relationships we find ourselves.

very tree is known by its fruits" is a divine maxim which affirms the clear divide between the attitude of the new man in his role relationships and whatever it was before his new birth experience. This is to say, in other words, that the transformed mind-set which now orders the new man's perceptions, actions and responses to other stakeholders in whatever relationship he finds himself- at home, the church, business, career, etc-would naturally chip off and smoothen whatever rough edges that could otherwise mar such relationships. It also becomes apparent upon the new birth experience that some of the traditional societal values and mores are in utter conflict with the established scriptural standards and must therefore be set aside so the new man can fully express the traits which are in consonance with the kingdom life and principles

TEXT: MATTHEW 5:3, ISAIAH. 57:15, LUKE 18:10-14

AIM:

To help participants understand what it means to be poor in spirit and why that is an indispensable key for access into the kingdom of God.



INTRODUCTION

he world has its own idea of blessedness. Blessed is the man who is always right. Blessed is the man who is satisfied with himself. Blessed is the man who is strong. Blessed is the man who rules. Blessed is the man who is rich. Blessed is the man who is popular. Blessed is the man who enjoys life. These are the beatitudes of this present world.

The "beatitudes" has been severally described as principles of the kingdom or the character of the kingdom citizens. In it our Lord Jesus declares to those who would follow Him(His disciples) the character traits that will mark out those who belong to His Kingdom. The first of these character

traits is the focus of our study today. We will be looking at what it means to be poor in spirit and why due recourse to this particular trait is a must for all who crave for access into and genuine citizenship of the kingdom of God.

CONCLUSION

The Greek word 'ptochos' translated as poor in our key text means a beggar, one who absolutely depends on charity. That is the true picture of the new man who, in relation to God, lives a life of perpetual dependence. He is like a beggar who begs you today and tomorrow is still ready to beg you again because he knows his sufficiency in life is never of himself. A man who, like David, has this attitude is always looking up to God in prayer, Psa. 121.

o 'mourn' as used by Christ in our text is to grieve over a situation or circumstance; to express deep concern and unhappiness (as opposed to a nonchalant and uncaring attitude), usually out of godly jealousy. It could be about us (as individuals) or others. This study should be a measurement instrument which should help us to examine our lives as Christians.

- 2. Explain the biblical concept of mourning further, from these texts, taking note of the different forms of its expression: Joshua 7:4-10; Neh. 1:1-4; 2

- 3. Identify some of the situations or circumstances in our society and Church today that should make the Christian mourn.

CONCLUSION

Christian mourning is a form of suffering for Christ and His Kingdom. Comedy may have little value, yet it is not everything that a Christian should joke about. We are expected to be always sober and vigilant so that the enemy does not take us unawares. More importantly, we need to have solid convictions to be able to firmly resist evil even in our grief over same.

AIM:

To explain meekness; help us understand what it means; and examine the Church today in the light of this virtue, with a view to motivating us to embrace same in our character formation as Christians today.

his study is about meekness. To be meek is to refrain from using or exercising one's power, authority, right or privileges to hurt or damage others, especially where such are at one's mercy, because of the position we hold and enormity of the power or influence we wield. Usually, a meek person is not harsh and is always calm because he does not respond to issues, circumstances or situations based on his strength, power or position. Jesus is the perfect example here. We should use this study to examine our lives in the light of God's word.

Meek people are not grabbers. They are not schemers. They don't use

their powers, authority, position or influence to hurt other people. They are not overbearing, and are not high handed. They have respect for the dignity and worth of others, no



matter how low such might be. You can probably mention more. Such was Jesus Christ, the Apostle Paul and most other New Testament figures.

CONCLUSION

hough meekness is similar to humility, the two virtues are different. The fact also remains that if somebody has one, he would most likely also have the other. In other words, meek people are also humble and vice versa. Generally speaking, humble and meek people do not show off, are not loud, and are quite often perceived as weak. But In actual fact, they are strong because their strength and sufficiency is in God. That is why it is 'the Meek that will inherit the earth'. This statement of Christ actually shows us that whereas it is the general perception of people that the world is for the strong, in God's kingdom value, it is quite the opposite.

The virtue of humility and meekness is really in short supply in the Church today, and it is most unfortunate. It also goes to show the extent to which the Church has become more like the world in contrast to the new man as revealed in the New Testament, Sad!

TEXT:

MATTHEW.5:6; PSALM 42:1; 107:9

AIM: To explain what it means to hunger and thirst after righteousness; examine the danger of losing this otherwise normal state as Christians; and examine ourselves in the light of this virtue, with a view to motivating us to pursue, cultivate or recover same today.



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ost of us, if not all, have been hungry and thirsty before at one time or the other. There is a very irresistible urge that crave for satisfaction in the person who is hungry or thirsty. If the abnormal situation occurs in which someone happens to be having a challenge at getting hungry, such a person would need medical attention. that is purely physical. However, it is much the same for spiritual hunger which Jesus is addressing in Matt.5:6. 'Hungering and thirsting after righteousness' was Christ's way of describing sustained passion or hunger for God.

In this study, we should see ourselves as undergoing examination about hunger for

righteousness. If at the end of the study we see ourselves



doing well 'in health' on the scale of scripture, we should give God the glory, and work at never allowing that state to slip. But if the contrary is the case, we should be humble enough to seek help from the Lord because that would mean we are fatally ill in the spirit!

CONCLUSION

hirsting after righteousness should be a normal experience for every genuine Christian. But if it is not, it just might be a diagnosis pointing to some more serious spiritual ailment. After all, dead people or those in some very critical health condition do not experience hunger!

Again, just as the satisfied person hates to eat or drink, so it is in the realm of the spirit. If someone is already satisfied with some other thing, most likely of worldly appeal, there is no way he/she can at the same time be hungry and thirsty for righteousness. But let the same person be full of God in Christ, even the bitter experiences of life will still be sweet as the great teacher has said in Prov. 27:7. The blessedness of hunger and thirst for righteousness is sufficient encouragement for us, just as no one would like to test God's resolve with going back on our spiritual consecration.

TEXT: MATTHEW 5:7.

AIMS:

To contrast kingdom values with worldly values, and teach us to show mercy to people so that we can receive mercy.



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he sermon of Jesus on the mount started with the beatitudes which are a series of statements describing the divine satisfaction that comes from the right relationship with God. It conveys the general meaning of being happy or joyful but it is spiritual blessedness.

The fifth beatitude states. "Blessed are the merciful for they will be shown mercy," meaning we are blessed if we are merciful. To be merciful is to show forgiveness and have compassion for those in need. Jesus frequently spoke of it and acted it out in his life throughout his ministry on earth. We, as Christians are equally

supposed to talk about it and act accordingly in order that we may obtain mercy from God. God's mercy is the withholding of a just punishment which we deserve to receive. That's why Jesus declared, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice, for I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

Our salvation is simply a divine act of mercy and certainly not because of the righteous things we have done. Therefore, we must endeavor to consistently show mercy to others so we may receive God's mercy.

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here are those who think that once they have given their lives to Christ, they will be shielded from persecutions and challenges of life. This is far from the truth. In fact, persecution is one of the things Jesus promised His followers: "I tell you the truth, no man who has left home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for me and the gospel will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age - homes, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and fields, with persecutions and in the age to come, eternal life" (Matt. 10:29-30). Persecution is one of the packages which await all who would walk in the newness of life. Knowledge of this biblical

fact engenders in the new man the right mind-set which enables him to comprehend and positively respond to issues of persecution.

This study should serve as an eye-opener to the brethren that as Christians, there is something to gain from being persecuted.

of Egypt's Prime Minister. Our Lord Himself was persecuted while on earth but later earned for Himself a Name that is above every other name in heaven, in earth, and under the earth. The surest but narrow way to divine promotion is through persecution. Are you going through one? Be patient and courageous; you will be rewarded at the end, if you persevere.

ove for our enemies is a one of the **4**fundamental Christian virtues which are being unwittingly expunged from the spiritual Dictionary of the average believer in our generation. Christian love is a character which should be applied to all, friends and foes alike, Love for God and our neighbours is the culmination of all the commandments. (Lev. 19:18, I Cor.13).

An enemy is someone who is hostile to, feels hatred towards, opposes the interests of or intends injury to" us. Anybody can fit into this mould who unwittingly or otherwise yields himself as a tool for Satanic manipulation and oppression. The situation is even dicier where the enemy is from within (eg.,

a member of one's own household). But whatever the case may be, the new man is expected to toe the line of our Lord **********************

Jesus who both taught and exemplified the need to love one's enemy.

The pervading teaching in most Christian circles which encourages believers to wish, seek, and pray for the death of their enemies seems to contradict what Jesus taught and lived for. Our love should not be limited to only those who love us, but should also be fully extended to those who hate, persecute, and despitefully use us (Matt. 5: 44, Lk. 6: 28). Therein lies an essential difference between the new man and the unbeliever whose min is not yet regenerated. O Lord, grant us wisdom in this study! Amen!!

Love for the enemy is one of the several proofs that one has experienced genuine divine transformation through simple faith in Christ Jesus, and that is a character of the new man.

not even on the minutest of details.

It is required that new wine be bottled in new wineskin so the new may never be contaminated by any trace of the imperfections of the old, soured wine, in the old wineskin.

INTRODUCTION

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h e n th e righteous are in authority, the people rejoice; but when the wicked rules, the people groan." (Prov. 29:2). The style and effect of governance on any given people is, to a large extent, a reflection of the attitude of those at the helm of affairs in that community, state or nation.

The bible is replete with stories of suffering and hardship the people of G o d a n d o t h e r s experienced under wicked and ungodly rulers. The story remains the same even in most contemporary societies where God is either relegated or totally eschewed from the circles of governance. This study should stir believers up to

the stark reality that our society is passing through terrible times as a consequence of a dearth of godly leadership, and



also point out the urgent need for genuine Christians to henceforth seek for political offices essentially as a means of impacting positively upon the people through godly leadership.

TEXT:

LUKE 10:25-37

AIM:

To encourage believers to show kindness to strangers.

INTRODUCTION

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ne of our most rewarding services as Christians is when we entertain, help, and defend strangers. Abraham, the acclaimed father of our faith, left us a very powerful example in this matter when he entertained angels without knowing it and thereupon received a very solid divine commitment which culminated in the birth of Isaac at a time when it seemed an impossible feat.

The current trend among Christians whereby strangers are abused, maltreated or discriminated against is certainly part of the many indications that the

Church is sick and misfocused. Believers need to take a cue from the Parable of the Good Samaritan with which Jesus sought to establish the importance of reaching out to people in need irrespective of who they are or where they come from

CONCLUSION

Peal love for others, especially strangers, produces tangible action. In the Old Testament, people unwittingly entertained angels and received instant divine rewards for their actions. A good example is Abraham (Gen. 18:1ff). Some Christians may give various reasons why they cannot be hospitable, but the truth is that most of these excuses are borne out of some eccentric, selfish or parochial tendencies which are antithetical to the life of the new man. It is important to note here that whosoever would

please God and impact positively upon his generation must be one whose love for God and for mankind must be one without simulation, a love that is expressed through such actions as genuine kindness to strangers.

TOPIC: DISHONESTY, **DECEIT AND HYPOCRISY**

TEXT: EPHESSIANS 4: 25-31, Col. 3: 8.9

AIM:

To help participants see that dishonesty, deceit and hypocrisy are at variance with the character of the new man and should. therefore, be put off so the believer can truly reflect Christ in all spheres of life.

INTRODUCTION

ishonesty, deceit and hypocrisy are moral vices which are evidently out of sync with the true character of the new man.

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DISHONESTY: is a lack of honesty or integrity; a disposition to lie, cheat or steal

DECEIT: This is the act or practice of deceiving; a tendency to deceive; the quality of being fraudulent.

HYPOCRISY: is the condition of a person pretending to be something he is not, especially in the area of morals or religion.

Apostle Paul strongly advised Christians to get rid of all malice, deceit, hypocrisy, envy and slander of every kind as these could hinder the spiritual growth of a believer. This study should enlighten us more on the imperativeness of

doing away with these vices and the consequences of harboring them in the believer's life.

TEXT: ECCLESSIASTES 7:9

AIM:

To assist brethren understand the dire consequences of uncontrolled anger and the urgent need to do away with it.

INTRODUCTION

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ncontrolled anger is defined as the exhibition of bitterness, rage and bad temper beyond control. The wise teacher counselled against allowing oneself to be quickly provoked as that is a crass display of foolishness (Ecc. 7: 9). More serious is the fact that uncontrolled anger can destroy in a moment what has taken us years to put in place. Calamities and disasters have befallen some people who did not deem it essential to control their anger. This study should help us appreciate the dire consequences uncontrolled anger and the need to put it far away from our lives as Christians.

INTRODUCTION

areless talk means making utterances that are unhealthy, destructive unreasonable. The word careless is the expression of an attitude that is devoid of good manners. Slander connotes the act of speaking ill of someone while gossip means telling stories about other people's private lives that may be unkind or untrue. Apostle Paul persuades the brethren in Ephesus not to allow any unwholesome talk come out of their mouth, but only what is helpful for the building of others according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen.


TEXT:

AIM:

To help believers understand the dangers in harboring bitterness, malice and jealousy and the urgent need to kick them out of our lives so we can be better ambassadors of Christ in our role relationships.

subject matter.



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Bitterness, malice and jealousy are some of the attitudes/ characters of the old man that we need to do away with in our lives and in the body of Christ. Bitterness is a feeling of anger and unhappiness over unfair treatment.

Malice is the desire to cause pain, injury, or distress to another. Jealousy means someone feeling unhappy because somebody you like or love is showing interest in somebody else or is liked by someone else. It is also feeling angry or unhappy because you wish you had something that somebody else has. Each of these is naturally malignant in their make-up and approach and, therefore, inconsistent with the character of the new man. This study should enlighten us more on this

INTRODUCTION

iscrimination is one attitude that has become endemic in the body of Christ and must done away with completely if the body of Christ is to be what she should be- the salt of the earth and light of the world.

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Discrimination is the practice of unfairly treating somebody or a particular group of persons in society differently from other people. Discrimination comes in various shades, colours and dimensions and has been the bane of the Church. In this study we shall see how we can get rid of this monster from the body of Christ.

To help believers understand the destructive implications of laziness, slothfulness and complacency and the need to quickly disengage oneself from their reproachful dispositions.

INTRODUCTION

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aziness, simply defined, is inactivity dresulting from a dislike of work: disinclination to or dislike for activity or exertion despite having the ability to do so. Slothfulness has to do with habit of being lazy and unwilling to work. Complacency is a feeling of satisfaction with yourself or with a situation, so that you do not think any change is necessary. In this study, we shall learn how we can do away with these.

CONCLUSION

Prethren are here entreated to put away laziness, slothfulness and complacency as these would only breed poverty, lack and loneliness. We must take a cue from our Lord Jesus, the apostles and most other Church fathers who trod the lengths and breadths of the earth proclaiming the gospel and making disciples even in the face of all manner of opposition and hindrances which accosted them wherever they went. Again, despite his busy schedules in ministry, Paul devoted whatever spare time he had to tent making through which he earned his living and committed himself to taking care of some indigent brethren that flocked around him.

PRIDE, STUBBORNNESS AND DISRESPECT FOR AUTHORITY.

TEXT: ROM. 12: 1-5, 1THESS. 5:12-13.

AIMS:

To acquaint brethren with knowledge of the subtle reasons for defeat, loss and failure that exists in the killer attitude of pride, stubbornness and disrespect for authority, and how believers can step out of their evil trappings and flow seamlessly and victoriously in the true character of the new man.

INTRODUCTION

Pride involves selfex a l t a t i o n, haughtiness, conceit and presumption; "Thinking more highly of oneself than one ought to" (Rom. 12:3). It is unreasonable and inordinate selfesteem, an orientation contrary to the character of God and aptly personified as one of the deadly sins.

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Stubbornness is the trait of being difficult to handle; refusing to change one's mind or cause of action despite pressure to do so; resolute adherence to your own ideas or desires. It is exhibited in hardening of the heart, resisting the Holy Ghost (Acts 7:51) and refusing correction. Etc. Disrespect for authority is an expression of lack of respect for those in authority. It is a contemptuous mental attitude that is generally disrespectful to and can go to any length to defy constituted authority.

Whichever way, shade, or colour they manifest, pride, stubbornness and disrespect for authority are attitudes which are out of sync with the character of the new man and, therefore should be kicked out of the believer's life.

CONCLUSION

t is very clear from this study that the tripartite vices of pride, stubbornness and disrespect for authority are evil winds that leave on their trail, failure, stagnation and destruction, and should, therefore, not be given undue place in the life of the believer. It is important to always remember that every authority that exists at the



family, the church, work place, community, state, etc, has very strong divine approval and should as such be respected and supported.

AIM:

To help participants fully understand the meaning and ills of sexual perversions and to proffer ways one can stay free from sexual perversion.

INTRODUCTION

exual immorality is the "selling off" of sexual purity and involves any type of sexual expression outside the boundaries of a biblically defined marriage relationship (Matthew 19:4–5).

Satan twists things. Every good thing that God created, Satan works to pervert. God created sexuality and called it good (Genesis 1:27-28, 31).

Sexual perversion is a condition in which sexual excitement is associated with acts or imagery that are considered unusual within the culture or religion.

TOPIC:

LOVE

TEXT: 1 JOHN 4:7-21; COLOSSIANS, 3:12-15

AIM:

To help the New Man know that God is love, and that Love, is the acid test of the new birth experience.

INTRODUCTION

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ove is a primary characteristic of God and, therefore, the ultimate character of the believer in Christ Jesus. In 1 Corinthians 13, the apostle Paul declares unequivocally that whatever one does which is not borne out of love is a sheer display of hypocrisy.

The new man is created to be like Christ. As such, in order to really portray Christ in all his role relationships, the new man must clothe himself with love, which holds all the other Christian virtues like mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, forbearance, forgiveness, etc, together in perfect unity.


